
Casares

Living every day in a picturesque town with the ruins of an ancient castle and a backdrop of the vast ocean under the Mediterranean sun sounds like a fantasy, right? If you move to Casares, that could be your life!

Even if you've never lived in a small town before, you won't be sacrificing anything with Casares since it's only a few hours' drive from Malaga. The Plaza de Espana is the main square in Casares and the best place to spend long sunny days. There are adorable cafes where you can pull up a chair and share a drink with your neighbors. Many people love eating at Antiguo Bar Nuevo or going there for a cold Cerveza on a hot summer day. Wandering around the narrow streets, you'll see plenty of colorful flower pots standing out brightly against the white facades as you walk.

If you want to stretch your legs, there are plenty of places up by the castle's ruins and old churches to hike up to. We highly recommend taking your camera because you can see all the way to the Rock of Gibraltar over on the African coast on a clear day!





Manilva

When you're searching for the perfect home along the southern Spanish coast, folks might recommend giving Manilva a thorough look-see, and for good reason. On the Costa del Sol, there are plenty of places where people live easier, but Manilva is a hidden gem among them.

If you've been used to the crowds of major cities, you'll adore the leisure of living in a place with just 17,000 full-time residents. Many residents work in the agricultural industry, specifically in growing grapes. That means fresh, sweet wines that are locally produced. Just imagine sitting down in the balmy evenings with a taste of something grown and made right in your backyard!

Estepona

Located on the gorgeous Sun Coast of southern Spain, Estepona has never forgotten its roots, and the friendly people maintain a leisurely atmosphere in the modern age. One of the most elegant towns on the Costa del Sol, Estepona attracts people of all kinds year-round. Known as El Jardin de la Costa del Sol or the Garden of Costa del Sol, Estepona boasts luxurious white streets decked with blooming pots of colorful flowers.

Estepona's nickname as the Garden is well-deserved. The Orchidarium Estepona contains over 5,000 plants, including over 1,000 species of orchids from around the world. Talk about stopping to smell the roses!

Marbella

Nowhere can you find a lovelier place to live than Marbella, where residents love to splash their cash and in the ocean. The glamorous town of Marbella is one of the favorites among frequent visitors as an enchanting seaside place facing a lovely bay. It has resided at the foot of the Sierra Blanca for centuries, never once losing its old-world charm.

No need to splurge on drinks in fancy clubs; you can bring the party to the beach and dance on the sand with a drink in your hand! You should be ready to be up late since most clubs don't open before 11 PM or midnight.



Benahavis

Benahavis is perfect for people looking for a serene, natural landscape for their dream home. Located near the western end of the Sun Coast, Benahavis is quite close to the villages of Marbella, San Pedro, and Estepona. It's near the mountains, so you aren't right on the ocean, but you're close enough to get there with a short drive.

Many people love hiking along the Guadalmina River because there are many picturesque spots to stop and jump in the crystal-clear water. There are beautiful waterfalls and plunge pools for people who are feeling particularly adventurous.

Nueva Andalucia

Don't worry about the noise, though. You're secluded, so the honking of traffic and the hustle and bustle of big cities is a thing of the past.



Puerto Banus

Puerto Banus is renowned for being the suburb where the rich and famous live. Many clubs and designer boutiques surround the dazzlingly sandy beaches, which are perfect for people who want to make a splash during the long summer months. La Cala de Mijas




Visas

Anyone planning to live on the Costa del Sol will need a visa. Citizens of the EU don't need visas for Spanish residence, but if you're coming from somewhere else, you will. Even people from the EU must join the Register for Citizens of the Union. For others, there are a few different types of visas available.

There are work and highly skilled visas for those who've had a job offer from a company in Spain. Freelancers can apply for the self-employed visa, but keep in mind that it's valid for one year and can only be renewed four times, meaning that you can't stay for longer than five years on it.

Others may find the golden visa a viable option if you invest a minimum of 500,000 euros in a property. You can also invest in a company, bank, or treasury bonds, but the minimum investment is much higher. The golden visa is the preferred way to gain long-term residence in Spain.



Cost of Living

Spain is encouraging people worldwide to come to bask in their beautiful Andalucia region. The cost of living in Southern Spain is much lower than in most of Northern Europe. You'll be excited to find out how much more you can get for your money here! Opulent houses, designer clothes and accessories, and fantastic food are all available and surprisingly affordable. Weather

Costa del Sol is quite literally the Sun Coast. Residents enjoy over 320 days of sunshine yearly; that's almost 11 months! Who needs to wait for the summer when the sun is always out? The average temperature of the Mediterranean climate is 18 degrees C, and you never go below 14 degrees C, even during the winter. There's a reason people have been living in the area for almost 3,000 years!

When the sun's rays shine, you've always got a good excuse to laze around the beach. Stretching from La Linea de la Concepcion to Nerja, with 160 km of coastline, you never have to worry about the crowds. There's plenty of space to lay out your towel, set up a chair, and sunbathe.

It can get over 40 degrees C in the summertime, so it's no wonder that Spanish people don't want to work too hard in the late afternoons. Shopping

There are many beach bars along the coast with a wide variety of drinks and foods. Everyone's favorite traditional chiringuitos serve locally-caught fish and other seafood.

Try a pitcher of everyone's house sangria. It's different everywhere you go. Whether you're looking for something sweet, fruity, or even spicy, you're sure to find someone who makes it just the way you like.

If you're coming from North America, you might notice that everyone in Spain sups much later than you're accustomed to. Don't plan on making reservations for 5 or 6 PM. Most sit-down restaurants won't open until at least 730 or 8.

Looking for an afternoon snack? You might be out of luck since everyone takes a siesta to avoid the sweltering afternoons. Most shops and restaurants are closed between 2-7 PM, so make sure you have a substantial lunch and something else to nosh on.

Golf

San Roque Golf Club

Sunshine Golf

Golf Torrequebrada

Golf Torrequebrada opened in 1976, and people have loved the course ever since. It's very conveniently located just 20 minutes from Malaga Airport and the harbor of Benalmadena. There are plenty of breathtaking views and places to go for a drink after a rousing round of golf. You don't even have to leave the course; a beautiful bar/restaurant is on the club's property

Calanova Golf Club

Located in Mijas, known as the New Golf Valley in Malaga, Calanova Golf Club provides exquisite views of the ocean and the mountains while giving players a challenging course that requires skill and precision to navigate. There's good food and coffee whether you want to nosh before you play or after.

Santana Golf

If you're looking to ratchet up the difficulty and put your golfing skills to the test, you should give Santana Golf a second look. It's a Par 72 championship course and the perfect place to show off for your friends and coworkers. With gorgeous sea views of the Playa de la Cala and an upscale boardwalk to stroll along, you can spend your entire day just drinking in the warm sunshine.

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Activities

Kite surfing is one of the most popular activities. Enthusiasts adore Los Alamos Beach when the wind is just right. There's a designated area for kitesurfing and other nautical sports between April and October. Windsurfing and paddle surfing are also immensely popular. Not sure what any of those are? Well, this is the perfect time to learn.



Hiking

If you fancy a hike with mesmerizing coastal views, there is no better place than the Sierra de Mijas. Most of the hiking trails start in the village of Mijas Pueblo. However, the numerous trails vary in length, so you can choose anything from a one to seven-hour route, depending on your fitness level. Many trails are steep, so you may want to bring your knee brace or hiking poles if you're worried.

One of the most awe-inspiring places to walk around is the Nerja Caves. They're only a 10-minute drive from Nerja, and since it's entirely underground, you can take a break from the scorching summer sunlight. The caves extend over 5km, so there are plenty of nooks and crannies to explore. One chamber is used as a concert hall because of the fantastic acoustics.

Waterparks

The largest and oldest waterpark in Malaga province, Aqualand Torremolinos, definitely won't disappoint. There are a whopping 15 waterslides for kids and ten just for thrill-seeking adults. With the enormous number of pools and watery areas, you're sure to find a good spot. There's even a separate area for people with younger kids who aren't up to the slides.

You'll even find Europe's tallest waterslide, clocking in at 22 meters high, known as the Kamikaze! When you've had your fill of water and need a break, there are multiple restaurants to choose from and a picnic place where you can bring your own food. If you go during the summertime, you can expect the crowds since Aqualand is so famous, but with Costa del Sol's nearly year-round sunshine, you can easily go in the offseason too.



Treetop Adventure Park

Located near Malaga in the heart of the Sierra de los Camarolos, Pindongos marks a new trend: treetop adventure parks. Most people think of Costa del Sol as primarily a beach (since it's a coast), but the region is also quite mountainous, with plenty of strong trees growing along rivers. So, what is a treetop adventure park? It's a place for people of all ages who want to return to their ape ancestry and swing among the leaves.

There are hanging bridges, ziplines, swings, rock climbing, and more. Unlike more commercialized parks, you feel one with nature at Pindongos. There are three routes to choose from, depending on your group's fitness level and desire for a challenge. It's completely safe for kids and adults, so everyone can tap into their inner Tarzan and feel like the king of the jungle!





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
